Susan Harris-Hümmert (German University of Administrative Sciences Speyer, Germany)

After studying German literature, pedagogy and French in Manchester, Regensburg and Oxford, Susan Harris-Hümmert completed her doctoral studies in Oxford on the work of evaluators of higher education in Germany. Since 2015 she has been working as a research fellow and assistant professor at the German University of Administrative Sciences Speyer where she is examining notions of space and place within the higher education context and the management of higher education estate in particular. Susan is a Senate member in Speyer, a Governing Council member of the Society for Research into Higher Education (SRHE), co-convenor of the Working Committee on Higher Education for the German Society for Evaluation (DeGEval) and Associate Fellow of the Higher Education Academy (HEA). She has published many international papers and reviews for the SRHE and other international bodies.

Joseph C. Hermanowicz is professor of sociology and adjunct professor in the Institute of Higher Education at the University of Georgia. He is the author of *Lives in Science: How Institutions Affect Academic Careers* (University of Chicago Press, 2009), *The Stars Are Not Enough: Scientists—Their Passions and Professions* (University of Chicago Press, 1998); editor of *The American Academic Profession: Transformation in Contemporary Higher Education* (Johns Hopkins University Press 2011) and a forthcoming volume (from Johns Hopkins University Press) on academic freedom, to be published Spring, 2020, as well as articles and chapters in the sociology of higher education, including most recently, "The Professoriate in International Perspective," in *Higher Education: Handbook of Theory and Research*, "The Proliferation of Publishing: Economic Rationality and Ritualized Productivity in a Neoliberal Era," in the *American Sociologist*, and "Universities, Academic Careers, and the Valorization of 'Shiny Things'," in *Research in the Sociology of Organizations*.

Dr. Miguel Antonio Lim is Lecturer in Education and International Development, Programme Director of the MA Education (International) and Research Coordinator at the Manchester Institute of Education at the University of Manchester. His research interests include performance metrics, internationalisation, and reputation management in higher education. He is task force leader on migration and higher education at the EU-Marie Curie Alumni Association. Previously, he was EU-Marie Curie Fellow at Aarhus University, Denmark. He has worked on international partnerships for Sciences Po-Paris and taught at the London School of Economics (LSE). From 2010-2012, he was the Executive Director of the Global Public Policy Network Secretariat.
