
Polycentricity Webinar Series

William Blomquist is Professor of Political Science and Adjunct Professor of Public and Environmental Affairs at Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis (IUPUI), and a Senior Research Fellow of the IU Ostrom Workshop.



Andreas Thiel is Chair of International Agricultural Policy and Environmental Governance at the Faculty of Organic Agricultural Sciences, University of Kassel, Germany. He is affiliated faculty of the Vincent and Elinor Ostrom Workshop in Political Theory and Policy Analysis and recently, he was Senior Research Fellow of the Käte Hamburger Kolleg for Global Cooperation Research at University of Duisburg-Essen, Germany.



Tom Koontz is Professor of Environmental Policy at the University of Washington, Tacoma (USA). He is affiliated faculty of the Vincent and Elinor Ostrom Workshop in Political Theory and Policy Analysis. His research on collaboration and environmental governance has included cases in Germany, India, Ohio (USA), and most recently the Puget Sound (USA).



Sergio Villamayor-Tomas is currently Ramon y Cajal Research Fellow at the Institute of Environmental Science and Technology (ICTA-UAB), at the Autonomous University of Barcelona. He is also affiliated with the Ostrom's Workshop (Indiana University) and the Berlin Workshop in Institutional Analysis of Socio-Ecological Systems (WINS).



Bryan Bruns is an independent researcher and consultant with a particular interest in water governance, cooperation, and transforming social situations. He holds a Ph.D. in Sociology of Development from Cornell University (1991).
